From **Big** to small...

The Catholic Church: The historic and undivided Catholic Church of the first Christian millennium is comprised of those church communions in the world today who have maintained the same Scriptures, Sacraments (e.g., holy Baptism and holy Communion), Creeds (e.g., the Apostles' and Nicene Creed), Ecumenical Councils (i.e., those ancient Councils accepted by the whole Church east and west) and Orders of Ministry (i.e., bishops, priests and deacons ordained in the apostolic succession and who can trace their orders back to Christ and the Apostles) as that of the historic and undivided Catholic Church. Among the church communions who have maintained the essentials of "Catholic Christendom" are the Anglican Communion, the Eastern Orthodox Communion and the Roman Catholic Church (although the latter has added much to the ancient Catholic Faith - to what is required by the faithful to be believed). Although "reformed", Anglicanism has never claimed its own Scriptures, Faith, Councils, Sacraments or Orders of Ministry, but rather has maintained, proclaimed and celebrated the Scriptures, Creedal Faith, Councils, Sacraments and Orders of Ministry of the Catholic Church of the first Christian millennium. Thus, Anglicans are Catholic!

Anglicanism: Anglicanism is both reformed (i.e., "protestant" in the best sense of the word; to be "protestament", that is, to give positive testimony to the authority of the holy Bible within the Church) and Catholic. The principle of the English Reformation was to return the Catholic Church in the Realm of England (and subsequently those in communion with her) to the Faith and Order of the undivided Catholic Church under the authority and primacy of Holy Scripture as God's Word written. Thus, Anglicans are, "Bible Catholics". We hold to the Catholic Faith and Order of God's holy Word. The Bible, as God's Word, and not the Pope, is our highest authority as to what is truly Catholic. "We have returned to the Apostles and the old Catholic Fathers. <u>We have planted no new religion</u>, but only preserved the old that was undoubtedly founded and used by the Apostles of Christ and other holy Fathers of the Primitive Church". -- John Jewel, English Reformer, <u>Apologia Ecclesiae Anglicanae</u>, 1562.

The Anglican Communion: Unlike many of our North American Christian brothers and sisters who belong to Protestant Denominations, most Anglicans belong to a worldwide Communion, known as the Anglican Communion. The Communion is comprised of thirty-seven Regional Provinces throughout the world who are in communion with the Church of England and the See (i.e., the chair or seat of authority of the Archbishop) of Canterbury. Each regional Province holds "*autonomy in communion*". That is, it is free to exercise its local autonomy, but <u>not</u> at the expense of the communion it shares with the greater worldwide family (much like a marriage). Also, Anglican autonomy is subject to the Holy Scriptures and the Faith and Order of the early Church. Anglicans share the same Scriptures, Creeds (Faith), Sacraments and Orders of Ministry. This unity not only unites Anglicans throughout the world in the present day, but also unites Anglicans with the once undivided Catholic Church of the first Christian millennium and the Church of every age (from Pentecost to the Second Advent - Coming - of Christ).

Schism/Brokenness: Alas, some of the regional provinces of the Anglican Communion have chosen to exercise their local autonomy at the expense of their communion with the global family and have also (to greater and lesser degrees) severed their ties with the historic Faith and Order of both the Holy Scriptures and the undivided Catholic Church. This has caused much sadness within God's family, the Church. These actions have resulted in "impaired" or even outright "broken" communion within the global body of Anglicans. The majority of the

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Anglican Communion has remained faithful to the Holy Scriptures and the Catholic Faith and Order of the ancient Church. About twenty to thirty percent have not (again, to greater and lesser degrees). For example, the Episcopal Church in the United States, while officially in Communion with the Church of England, is in a state of impaired or broken communion with the vast majority of the world's faithful Anglicans. Within any covenant relationship, if autonomy is exercised at the expense of unity, the covenant cannot stand (this is true in marriage, in friendship, in legal corporate partnerships, etc).

Healing and the ACNA: The Province of the Anglican Church in North America, commonly known as "the ACNA" (to which we belong), is comprised of several smaller Anglican bodies, most of whom separated themselves from the Episcopal Church in the United States or the Anglican Church in Canada due to the abandonment of the Biblical and Catholic Faith and Order by these two regional provinces (or perhaps more correctly, recognized that these two bodies left us in the name of modernism). Thus, the ACNA is an attempt to bring together a number of orthodox believing Anglicans in North America. It is an attempt, we believe under the guidance of the Holy Spirit, to preserve a biblical and faithful Anglican presence and witness in North America. Most Anglicans in the world recognize the ACNA as <u>*THE*</u> Anglican body in North America. Some smaller orthodox Anglican bodies, who have not yet joined the ACNA, are either in the process of exploring such unity or have opened up helpful and healthy avenues of communication. God be praised! Let us pray for the unity of the church.

What about those who disagree with one or more of the theological or moral positions of the ACNA?: As long as a person is open to the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ and to growing in the faith which God has revealed in his holy Word, he or she remains in good standing. We must never hate those who disagree with us. The Gospel calls us to share the truth in love. This we must do. We all struggle with aspects of the faith from time to time. It is not always an easy process (not even for me). We should seek God's guidance through prayer, Scripture reading and study and meeting with our priest to wrestle with these ideas in such a way that allows God to speak to us. It is only when a person's heart is hardened to the Spirit (i.e., relying on the "wisdom" of the world, our own personal opinions or experience or when we are closed to the Gospel or to the Bible as God's Word), that persons may be asked not to serve in leadership or ministry positions.

Anglicanism is a fellowship (or "branch" for a lack of better word) of the historic and once undivided Catholic Church of the first Christian millennium.

THE INFINITE, UNCHANGING LOVE OF GOD

The love of Christ will give you strength for the impossible. Looking back over these last three years with Scotty, I guess was stressful. My dearest Scotty had been deteriorating slowly at first and then lost momentum the last four months. During this time I was not actually aware of the stress. My God through the Holy Spirit and the love of Christ gave me such strength that it was beyond explanation. The love Scotty and I shared was supernatural the last months of his life with me. The night of his departure, which only he and I shared, was magnificent, as our Savior met him at the door, and welcomed him home. The room was filled with a light that cannot be explained.

Have you ever felt your love for others growing thin during stressful times? That's when we need to remember that love is a decision, not a feeling, and we choose to love. In Matthew 24: 12-14, Jesus tells us to persevere in our love for God through difficult times: "Because lawlessness will abound, the love of many will grow cold. But he who endures to the end shall be saved." He then says: "and this gospel of the kingdom will be preached in all the world as a witness to all the nations, and then the end will come" v.14.

As believers, our goal is to see the Word is spoken to all who we encounter. To preach the gospel to the world, and our motivation is His love.

Galatians 6: 9 promises, "And let us not grow weary in well-doing, for in due season we shall reap, if we do not lose heart". We don't want to lose a great harvest because we have grown weary.

How do we get love that perseveres? This can only come from God, who is love. 1 John 4:8 tells us, "God so loved the world that He gave His only begotten Son." How awesome is this that our God loved us so much that he allowed His Son to suffer the agony of such a cruel death for us.

Get rid of wrong thoughts so you don't react based on old ways of thinking – out of fear, loneliness or lack. There is no limit to His love, grace and provision.

Paul writes in Ephesians 2: 4-5: "But God, who is rich in mercy, out of His great love with which He loved us, even when we were dead through our trespasses, made us alive together with Christ". If you feel rejected or anxious, capture every negative thought and put it under the dominion of Jesus.

Paul prays: Ephesians 3: 17-19, "and that Christ may dwell in your hearts through faith; that you, being rooted and grounded in love, may have power to comprehend with all the saints what is the breadth and length and height and depth, and to know the love of Christ which surpasses knowledge, that you may be filled with all the fullness of God."

Love is not just an attribute of God; it is His very essence, and He pours it into us. His love is infinite, timeless and unchanging. It is so big, it includes all people for all time – even those you may be tempted to hate. He died for them. Ephesians 5: 1-2 "Therefore be imitators of God, as beloved children, and walk in love, as Christ loved us and gave Himself up for us, a fragrant offering and sacrifice to God."

Tap into this on a daily bases, the love of Christ will give you strength for the impossible.

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Week of Fasting in August and September

Archdeacon Michael has set apart six days for prayer and fasting and is asking that one or more persons sign-up to fast on each of the days appointed (Monday, August 14 – Saturday, August 19 and Monday, September 11 – Saturday, September 16). Our week of fasting will conclude with a Day of Prayer to be held from 6:00 a.m. – 6:00 p.m. on Saturday, August 19 and Saturday, September 16. Persons pray for one hour in the comfort of their home. The Archdeacon is asking that a minimum of twelve persons sign-up to pray for one hour of prayer. This way at least one person will be fasting every day that week on behalf of the church family and at least one person will be praying from approximately sunup to sundown on the Day of Prayer. Sign-up sheets are on in the Fellowship Hall.

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FATHER BOB'S BOOK STUDY: As we wrapped up our time together last spring, several people in the group asked me if I would make Postmodernism the subject for the next Book Study. During the year, we had talked off and on about Postmodernism: The contemporary philosophy that it is "true" that there is no such thing as "truth", as we usually understand "truth". Unfortunately, this ironic notion has become as widespread and powerful as it is ridiculous. It is a point of view that stands as a major obstacle to communicating the Christian Message in today's society. One must understand it in order to get around it. Those people who made the request for a Book Study on the subject were asking that we look at Postmodernism systematically.

Since June I have reviewed a number of texts that might serve as the backbone for our study. I've come up tentatively with four, two books and two essays. These are as follows:

- T. Mosteller, Theories of Truth: An Introduction. (9 chapters; 198 pages)
- H. White, Postmodernism: A First Course for Christians (10 chapters, 170 pages).
- H. Frankfurt, On Truth. (101 pages)
- H. Frankfurt, On Bullshit. (67 pages)

I have not worked out a meeting schedule yet. I'm holding off on that until I can find out how many people would be willing to make a commitment to do the reading and to attend meetings as regularly as possible. Any meeting schedule would probably get us together approximately twice a month, and we would be reading on and discussing the topic through June of 2018. In considering whether to "sign on" or not, please be aware that Fr. Michael is planning to hold his Christian Education course weekly during the coming year. Making a serious commitment to the Book Study would preclude attending his classes on conflicting dates.

As folks who have participated know, the Book Study stands or falls on the participation of the group. Before finalizing things, I need to know if there is a critical mass of people willing to commit. The magic number is seven. If you want to join in on this, please talk to me or e-mail me sometime during August. If we get to seven, I'll roll out a specific schedule and we'll get going before the end of September. Of course, if you have further questions about the Book Study, please feel free to get in touch any time.
