Dear Members and Friends of Holy Trinity Anglican Church, Marlborough, MA,

Grace & Peace to you in Christ Jesus our Lord!

HTAC = Holy Trinity Anglican Church, Marlborough, MA (our church family in French Hill and beyond)

ANiC = Anglican Network in Canada (our diocese)

ACNA = The Province of the Anglican Church in North America (our province)

We will soon have updated worship booklets at HTAC to be used on Sundays and for worship during the week. They will be similar to our present worship booklets. However, there are a few significant differences. As your priest and pastor, I wish to highlight a few of them for you (let us prepare together):

- We have typically begun the Mass by chanting, "In the Name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost. Amen". We will now from this day forward conform more fully to the "Opening Acclamation" prescribed by our Province in our liturgy, "Blessed be God: the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit...". While these words are not part of the post-English Reformation Prayer Book tradition, they are both patristic and ecumenical. They are a modern paraphrase of the most ancient Christian liturgies known to us today, especially those found in the ancient Christian east. The wondrous depth and ineffable wealth of these ancient liturgical words only serve to augment our present day worship. These words proclaim: 1) The Name of God as Trinity (i.e., one God in three distinct Persons), 2) God's eternal kingdom and 3) Our participation in God and his kingdom through worship (i.e., gathering, Word, Sacrament and going forth in the Name of Jesus into the world).
- We will now have two options for, "The Summary of Law". The first as written in the 1928 (American) Book of Common Prayer and the second as written in the 1962 (Canadian) Book of Common Prayer. While very similar, they employ different scriptural references. This addition has the permission of our Diocesan Bishop, The Right Reverend Charles "Charlie" F. Masters.
- We will continue to have our Choir sing the "Kyrie" in Greek (a most ancient tradition of the patristic/historic Church) and the "Agnus Dei" in Latin. However, once a month these prayers are/will be offered in English.
- In addition to the above bullet point, the new Rites of the ACNA call for the ancient, "Mystery of Faith," to be sung or said in one of the Eucharistic Prayers (i.e., "Christ has died. Christ is risen. Christ will come again.") and allow for it, as an option, in any of the eucharistic prayers used in the local congregation. When the "Kyrie" is sung in Greek and the "Agnus Dei" in Latin, we will sing the, "Mystery of Faith," in English. Once a month, when the "Kyrie" and the "Agnus" Dei" are sung in English, the "Mystery of Faith" will be omitted.
- There are two options allowed for the, "Prayers of the People" at HTAC. The second option will be incorporated into our new worship booklets and will no longer be an insert within the bulletin. Monica will be happy!
- There will be three options for the Eucharistic Prayer (please note: all three have the approval of the Province and our Diocesan Bishop). The first is the "Standard Text" (based on the 1928 American BCP); the second is known as the, "Ancient Text" (based on the ancient rites of the historic Catholic Church, to which we, as orthodox Anglicans, fully belong); and the third is based on the "1962 (Canadian) BCP". These Eucharistic Prayers connect us with the Celebration of the Holy Eucharist, i.e., the holy Mass, in every age of the Church from the time of Christ's first coming and his holy Apostles to the Second Coming of our Lord Jesus Christ at the end of time.

- THE BIGGEST CHANGE: A person worshiping at HTAC will notice that the new worship booklets are both in English and Spanish. We hope to offer the Mass in Spanish VERY soon. Fr. Isaac and Dcn. John will be launching a new church plant out of HTAC to our Spanish speaking neighbors in French Hill and beyond. Please pray for this very important mission of our church!
- The "Agnus Dei," whether sung by the HTAC Choir in Latin (as on most Sundays) or sung in English (once a month by all), will follow, "The Prayer of Humble Access" (perhaps the most beautiful prayer of the Post-English Reformation Prayer Book tradition).
- There are other changes, but the above serves as a basic introduction to these changes. If you have any questions, etc., please call Fr. Michael at 508-330-2179.

## The Collect for Holy Cross Day (September 14)

Almighty God, whose Son our Savior Jesus Christ was lifted high upon the cross that he might draw the whole world unto himself: Mercifully grant that we, who glory in the mystery of our redemption, may have grace to take up our cross and follow him; who liveth and reigneth with thee and the Holy Spirit, one God, in glory everlasting. Amen.

### "PARTICIPATION"

Having been a church musician for about forty (yes, 40!) years, I can say without fear of contradiction that few issues in a parish stir up more controversy than the musical portions of the service. This is not wrong, of course; there is nothing that we do that is more important than ensuring that the worship we offer to God at every service – especially on Sunday – is the best that we can offer. We don't always succeed, but God loves us anyway for the effort. And we are right to assign high priority to the musical aspects of liturgy being the best it can be.

One of the most misunderstood aspects of worship, in my opinion, is the concept of "participation". When Archbishop Cranmer set out to transform the Roman Catholic Church in England to the Church of England, he was firm about services being conducted in a language "understanded" of the people. Obviously that greatly enhanced the participation of the congregation in the service and their comprehension of what was being said and done during the service. It took our Roman Catholic brethren about 400 years to figure out that Cranmer's idea was right. Thus, at the Second Vatican Council, tremendous reforms were undertaken, resulting in the liturgy being performed in the native language of the particular congregation. Along with that change came new music and new approaches to congregational participation in the liturgy, especially the music.

Again in my opinion, the Second Vatican Council got it right when it set forth norms and principles regarding music in liturgy. Unfortunately, most Roman Catholic parishes in the United States threw out the baby with the bath water, completely ignoring those norms and principles, for the most part. Other denominations — including Anglicans — tended to follow their lead, resulting in misunderstanding about the roles of the various ministers in liturgy, especially the musicians, and poor quality music becoming regrettably common.

The great Christian apologist C. S. Lewis was not fond of church music; I don't know why, but he was not opposed to it, nor was he an advocate of any particular style, so far as I know. You can read some of what he had to say at this internet link: http://worshipandchurchmusic.com/cslewis.html. Lewis makes the point that what matters is the intention of the participants, which must always be to glorify God and bring others to Him.

I have used the words "participate" and "participation" several times in the previous paragraphs. So what do they mean? No two people will have the exact same definition, and that's as it should be, too. What the Second Vatican Council and Lewis both emphasize is that participation should be full, conscious and active. That does NOT mean that everybody says or sings everything; that is not what "active" means. Every person present at a liturgy has a distinct role to play in the mystery being celebrated, and no role is more important than any other; effective and beautiful worship comes into being when all present understand and perform their role.

"Active" means – as Lewis says – engaging the mind as well as the body (sight, sound, smell, and touch). We are actively participating when we listen to a sermon and think about what the preacher said. We are actively participating when we sing a hymn or psalm refrain. We are actively participating when we listen to the choir sing an anthem or some other special musical work, or the organist play a solo. As Lewis said: "When [the intention] succeeds, I think the performers are the most enviable of men; privileged while mortals to honor God like angels and, for a few golden moments, to see spirit and flesh, delight and labour, skill and worship, the natural and the supernatural, all fused into that unity they would have had before the Fall."

At Holy Trinity, we place great emphasis on doing the liturgy correctly so far as we are able, and that is how it should be. That means that our choir sings independently perhaps more than in other parishes. We do so in order to preserve our connection to the historical church – to put it another way, we resist throwing out the baby with the bath water. We cherish the past while looking forward with thanksgiving to what God has in store for us in the future. That means, also, that our choir endeavors to learn and share with the congregation the great musical works of the past as well as more modern expressions of our faith. Our choir sings music from the Renaissance up to and including living composers, all of whom have something to say to us if our hearts are open to it. We are actively participating not only when we perform music, but when we listen to it, too.

I circle back to the Second Vatican Council. We owe no allegiance to the Roman Catholic church, of course, but apostolic succession means, I believe, that we should remember our historical connection with it and learn from them, just as they learn from us (even though it took them 400 years or so to do so – God's time, not ours). 


