THE HOLY OILS!

The practice of anointing persons and places with consecrated oils is rooted in the Old and New Testaments, the liturgical practice of the early Church and in Anglican practice (both prior to and following the English Reformation). *“And you shall make of these a sacred anointing oil...And you shall anoint with it the tent of meeting and the ark of the testimony, and the table and all its utensils, and the lampstand and its utensils, and the altar of incense, and the altar of burnt offering with all its utensils and the laver and its base; you shall consecrate them, that they may be most holy; whatever touches them will become holy. And you shall anoint Aaron and his sons, and consecrate them, that they may serve me as priests. And you shall say to the people of Israel, This shall be my holy anointing oil throughout your generations”* (Ex. 30:25-31; see also Ex. 40:9). Thus, consecrated oil was used to bless the place of worship and the priests of God. The Second Ecumenical Council (Constantinople I) established the following canon in 381 AD, *“Those who embrace orthodoxy and join the number of those who are being saved...we receive in the following regular and customary manner...They are first sealed or anointed with holy chrism...As we seal them we say: “Seal of the gift of the holy Spirit”* (Canon VII). Thus, there is a clear biblical and patristic (i.e., early church) foundation for blessing places and people with holy oil.

Holy Unction (the anointing of the sick): Holy Unction has its New Testament origin in the general epistle of James, *“Is any among you sick? Let him call for the elders (presbyters) of the church, and let them pray over him, anointing him with oil in the name of the Lord; and the prayer of faith will save the sick man, and the Lord will raise him up; and if he has committed sins, he will be forgiven”* (James 5:14-15; see also Mark 6:13). In the Apostolic Tradition, Hippolytus makes reference to the liturgical blessing of oil, *“[T]he bishop shall give thanks...saying, ‘Sanctify this oil, O God, as you give holiness to all who are anointed and receive it...that it may give strength to all who taste it, and health to all who use it.’”* The first Book of Common Prayer (1549) preserved this practice of the ancient Church, *“As with this visible oil thy body outwardly is anointed: so our heavenly Father almighty God, grant of his infinite goodness, that thy soul inwardly may be anointed with the holy Ghost, who is the Spirit of all strength, comfort, relief, and gladness. And vouchsafe for his great mercy (if it be his blessed will) to restore unto thee thy bodily health, and strength...”*. Thus, since New Testament times, consecrated oil has been used for the anointing of the sick. As a sacramental rite of the Church, the anointing is administered to the baptized faithful only (although prayers with the laying on of hands for deliverance from sickness may be offered to the unbaptized). Since mankind is comprised of both a body and a soul, Holy Unction may be used in deliverance ministry, delivering persons from ailments of ungodly spiritual origin. Holy water, water blessed by a bishop or priest, is also used in deliverance ministry. Persons may be anointed with oil and receive prayer for healing at our 10:00 a.m. Mass on the Lord's Day. Also, we offer a Healing Service at 6:30 p.m. on the third Saturday of every month.

Chrism: We know from the writings of the Church Fathers that the early Church used Christ in sealing the newly baptized from , *“Just as Christ after His baptism and the descent of the Holy Spirit went forth to struggle against the adversary, likewise do we also after baptism and the imparting of the mystical chrism, clothed with the armor of the Holy Spirit, withstand the power of the adversary”* (St. Cyril of Jerusalem, 313 - 386). And again, *“After the washing (baptism) believers are anointed with the sweet-smelling oil. All these things were prefigured (in the Old Testament) for our sakes so that we might not regard as strange the things which are now done in the Church”*

(St. Hippolytus, 170 - 236). The New Testament also associates the apostolic gift of the Spirit with baptism, *“When they believed Philip [the Deacon] as he preached good news about the kingdom of God and the Name of Jesus Christ, they were baptized, both men and women... Now when the Apostles at Jerusalem heard that Samaria had received the Word of God, they sent to them Peter and John, who came down and prayed for them that they might receive the Holy Spirit; for it had not yet fallen on any of them, but they had only been baptized in the Name of the Lord Jesus. Then they laid their hands on them and they received the Holy Spirit”* (Acts. 8:12-17; see also Acts. 19:2-6). As the Church grew in number, bishops were unable to always be present for the “laying on of hands” of the newly baptized. Thus, chrism received episcopal consecration (i.e., it was consecrated by a Bishop), being set apart as a sign of the apostolic Seal of the Spirit. *“It is necessary for him who has been baptized also to be anointed, so that by having received the holy chrism, that is, by anointing, he can be the anointed of God and have in himself the grace of Christ”* (St. Hippolytus). *“Are you unwilling to be anointed with the oil of God? It is on this account that we are called Christians, because we are anointed with the oil of God”* (Theophilus, Bishop of Antioch, d. 181).

Oil of Catechumens: *“And they cast out many demons, and anointed with oil many that were sick and healed them”* (Mark 6:13). The oil of catechumens has no clear foundation in Holy Scripture per se (although the use of oil for the preparation of persons and things is certainly implied). The early Church used such an oil in preparing catechumens for holy baptism. *“After the renunciations, he anoints them with the oil of exorcism, saying: Let every evil spirit depart far from thee”* (Apostolic Tradition). Holy baptism was seen as deliverance from the kingdom of darkness and entrance into the Kingdom of Light through the promise of covenant. Many prayers with the laying on of hands and anointing helped prepare catechumens to receive the grace of God given in the sacrament of baptism. Although used in preparation for baptism, the oil of catechumens was not considered sacramental in the same way as was chrism and unction. Therefore, if oil is to be used in deliverance ministry, the ordained should employ holy unction.

These three sacred oils were readily employed by the early Church and closely associated with a person’s growth in Christ: to prepare persons for baptism, as a sign of the apostolic Seal of the Spirit and as an anointing to banish the ungodly ills of both body and soul. As we have seen, their use has both a biblical and patristic foundation.

Holy Unction: Used in the healing of God’s people from illness; physical, spiritual and emotional. May also be used in deliverance ministry (along with holy water).

Chrism: Used in anointing the newly baptized as a sign of the apostolic Seal of the Spirit. May also be used in ordination.

Oil of Catechumens: Used to prepare catechumens for holy baptism and associated with the exorcism of the unbaptized.

Hope this teaching is helpful.
