



My Dear Church Family and Friends of Holy Trinity Anglican Church,

Grace and peace to you in Christ Jesus our Lord and Saviour!

Priorities (Part 3 of 3):

What are our priorities as an Anglican church family? This is an important question. The answer (in order):

- **Divine Worship on the Lord's Day and during the week** (an extension of which is bringing the Gospel and Sacraments to the sick and homebound)
- **Evangelism** (proclaiming the Good News of Salvation in Jesus Christ in word and action)
- **Discipleship** (opportunities to grow in the Biblical Faith for both youth and adults)
- **Local Outreach** (manifesting the love of God to our neighbors and helping those in need)
- **Global Mission** (aiding in the above throughout the world)

I will give a brief definition of each and identify some examples of how we are presently living out our priorities. Please note: I addressed 1) Divine Worship (our highest priority as Christians); 2) visiting the sick and homebound (which is an extension of Divine Worship); 3) Christian evangelism, and 4) Discipleship in previous editions of, *The Messenger*.

Local Outreach (briefly defined): The Mass concludes with the words, "*Go in peace to love and serve the Lord.*" However, this is not the end of our worship, but only the beginning. We worship God by serving those for whom He died and rose. Thus, Christian worship continues outside the church; i.e., it overflows into our daily life. Our thoughts, words, and deeds, what we do and what we fail to do in God's Name, is worship. It is either the worship of Able, acceptable before the Lord, or Cain, unacceptable before the Lord. What makes the difference? The disposition of our heart. Do we seek to love, honour, and glorify the Lord with our thoughts, words, and deeds, etc, or do we seek to honour ourselves and to conform our life to the ways of the world, the flesh, and devil? We are called to love others as we are loved by the Lord, to forgive others as we are forgiven by the Lord, and to share the Good News with others, as we have received the Good News of Life and Salvation in Christ Jesus. God does not love us, forgive us, or offer us salvation because we deserve it, but because God's nature is love, and His character is always to have mercy. Thus, we are to love, forgive, serve, and share the Good News of God in Christ with others, not because they deserve it, but because we love God who has bestowed all of these gifts upon us undeservedly. In doing so, we become living icons of Christ Jesus in the world; a world that desperately needs to know the love and mercy of God, and His condemnation of sin which tears us from the presence of God. What outreach opportunities do we offer at HTAC to worship God outside of the Mass and to love others as we are loved by God?

- June's Table (feeding the hungry and others in need of fellowship, a sit-down, full service dinner every Saturday at 5:00 p.m.)
- The Winter Clothing Ministry (providing winter coats, gloves, hats, scarfs, boots, etc. during the cold New England winter)
- The Winter Grocery Ministry (providing fruit, vegetables, peanut butter and jelly, soup, spaghetti and sauce, rice, tunafish, chicken, etc. to those in need)
- The HTAC Food Pantry (year round)
- Summer Lunch Program (feeding the youth and others a nutritious lunch, Monday - Friday, for nine or ten weeks in the summer months)

- I also proudly serve as the Chaplain for the Marlborough Fire Department, and as a member of the Marlborough Rotary Club; "*Service above Self.*"
- We also serve girls and women in crisis pregnancies through our support of First Concern who provides counsel, medical care, housing, and necessary supplies to girls/women in need.

Global Mission (we support):

- St. Mary's Anglican Church, Kumasi, Ghana (our sister congregation)
- Sweats For Vets (providing warm clothing for homeless Veterans)
- Diocesan Church Planting Initiative (planting new congregations throughout our Diocese)
- Missionary to East Asia (a young Christian Missionary who brings the Gospel to those who do not know Jesus and who ministers under exceptionally dangerous conditions)
- Israel (CMJ - promoting the Good News of Jesus Christ among our Jewish brethren)
- The Bishop Donald & Trudy Harvey Legacy Trust (supporting youth ministry)
- St. Michael's Conference (a weeklong summer conference in the High Church Anglican tradition for youth 14-21)
- Cuba Mission (helping to establish and support Anglican church plants Cuba)
- ASAC, Rutland, VT (supporting our brothers and sisters in Rutland, VT to proclaim the Gospel and administer the Sacraments)

A SPECIAL CELEBRATION:

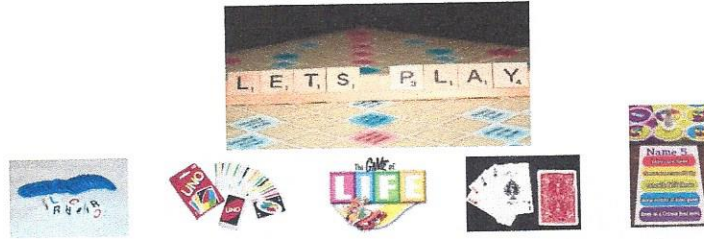

Holy Confession in Advent: Sacraments are marked moments of God's presence, anointing and healing in our lives. There are many good reasons to seek the assurance of pardon and absolution in the Sacrament (Sacramental Rite) of Confession: there are times when we need the assurance of God's love and forgiveness, marked moments of His healing grace and power; times when we are in need of Godly counsel and advice; times when we need to unburden our troubled consciences; and of course, times when we have fallen into grievous and willful sin. Confession is a Sacrament of Healing. It is a tour of the heart. Advent and Lent are particularly good times to seek the assurance of God's grace and forgiveness in Confession. The Sacrament of Confession is available by appointment. Please call Fr. Michael at 508-330-2179.

Holy Confession (going deeper): People long for marked moments of God's love, healing, forgiveness, and grace in their lives. The soul longs to find the mercy of God at the foot of the cross. Holy Confession and Absolution is one such moment. By the power of the Holy Spirit, one finds that the cross of Jesus becomes a present reality for them. They are truly at the foot of the cross and there they experience the love and mercy of God in a profound way. It is a marked moment, through which we are assured of God's forgiveness and the absolution of our sins. Holy Confession is not subjective ("I feel forgiven") but is objective ("I am forgiven"). We are assured of our forgiveness by the power and promise of God's Word and the authority of His Church. Sometimes we need to receive the Word of God declared through His priest, saying, "YOU ARE FORGIVEN." In Holy Confession, Jesus is not present to us as Divine Judge (unless we harden our hearts to His mercy), but as Divine Physician. He comes not to condemn, but to heal, restore, strengthen, and raise us up. See: John 20:23; 1 Timothy 2:3-4; 2 Peter 3:9; Ezekiel 18:23.

How Thinking About the Future Makes Life More Meaningful

Research suggests that thinking about the future—a process known as prospection— can help us lead more generous and fulfilled lives. ... Yes, thinking about the future can trigger anxiety—but a growing body of research suggests that it can also make our lives more meaningful and help us lead more generous and fulfilled lives.

It is this remarkable ability to simulate our possible futures that makes prospection special. Just like gold prospecting may literally make you rich, studies suggest that prospecting about your future can enrich your life in at least four ways.

1.Helps us make more prudent decisions:

Perhaps one of the most fundamental and important functions of prospection is that it helps us decide how to act: Thinking about what the future likely holds helps us decide what course to take in the here-and-now. Several studies have examined how thinking about the future shapes our decision-making.

2.Motivates us to achieve our goals (if we do it right):

While interesting in its own right, this research could have important personal ramifications. If people could be made to feel a more immediate connection to their eventual retirement (and consequent drop in income), they may be more motivated to make prudent decisions.

3.Improves psychological well-being:

There’s another technique that may help anyone improve their psychological health: “anticipatory savoring.” Taking time to simulate and enjoy a positive experience in advance—whether it be an upcoming meal, visit with friends,

4. Makes us more kind and generous:

How we think about the future doesn’t just influence our own lives. It can also influence how we treat other people.

How Thinking About Heaven and Hell makes The Christian Life More Meaningful

What do you think about? Do you think about your future? Thinking about the future is called prospection.

The future is defined as the time or period of time following the moment of speaking or writing; time regarded as still to come; afterlife.

As Biblical Christians our prospection is heaven.....The future God has planned for us. It would seem that God would have us think a lot about our spiritual future since He speaks often about our life after death. He promises that even after physical death our life goes on and on in one place or another....heaven or hell....YES it is one place or the other. And, it is conditional.

People, Christians, will often say, “oh hell is right here on earth”. Yes it often appears that way.

But there remains a future hell for those who don’t meet God’s criteria for heaven. Harsh? No!

Remember what it cost God to give us this choice.....His son Jesus Christ.....out of His great love for us.

Advent is a season of remembering the past, present, and making room in our hearts for the future.....the second coming to earth of Jesus.

But in the meantime people will die here on earth. It would seem the Christian’s prospection is a vital spiritual discipline assuring us of our hope AND loving others enough to warn them, “heaven or hell....it is your choice.”

May we think on these things to live and help others live God’s abundant life In the here and now.

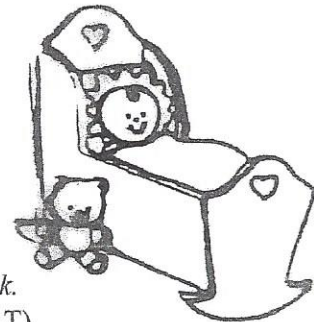

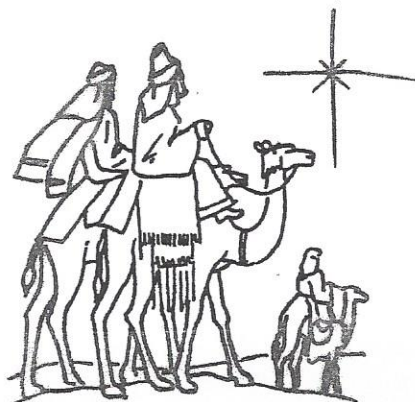

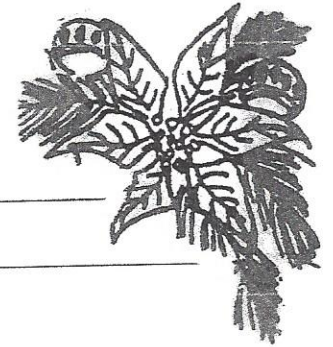
