

My Dear Church Family and Friends of Holy Trinity Anglican Church,

The Church Year: Participating in God's Story of Salvation!

On November 28, 2021, the First Sunday in Advent, we began the Christian liturgical year anew. The Christian year consists of several Seasons and special Feasts and Fasts set apart by the Church to enable God's People to enter more fully into the Incarnation of Jesus Christ and God's Story of Salvation: 1) Advent is a Penitential Season beginning four Sundays prior to the First Day of Christmas in which the Church participates, through Word and Sacrament, in the Second Coming of our Lord Jesus Christ who shall come to judge the quick and the dead - please see Matthew 25:31-46; 2) Christmas is a joyous Season in which the Church participates, through Word and Sacrament, in the Incarnation and first coming of our Lord Jesus Christ - please see Genesis 3:15; Luke 2:4-21 and John 3:16-17; 3) Epiphany is a joyous Season in which the Church participates, through Word and Sacrament, in the Father's revelation/manifestation of the true identity of His only-begotten Son as the coming in time of the timeless Son of God - it is the manifestation of the Son of God as Emmanuel, that is, God with us - please see Isaiah 60:1; John 1:1-18; Ephesians 3:3; Colossians 2:2-3; Matthew 2:1ff; 4) Lent and Holy Week is a Penitential Season in which the Church participates, through Word and Sacrament and a Season of "self-examination, and repentance; by prayer, fasting, and alms-giving; by reading and meditating on God's holy Word, (2019 BCP, 544) in the passion and death of our Lord Jesus Christ for the sins of the world - please see Isaiah 53:1-12; 1 Peter 2:24; John 19:1 - end; 5) Resurrection (or Easter) and Ascension is the zenith of all Christian Seasons in which the Church participates, through Word and Sacrament, in the ineffable joys of the Risen Christ, His eternal victory of sin and death, and His glorious Ascension into Heaven - please see Luke 24:13-35; Matthew 28:1 - end; 6) Pentecost is a joy-filled Season in which the Church participates, through Word and Sacrament, in the apostolic outpouring of the Holy Spirit and new life in Christ Jesus; and lastly 7) several Principal and Lesser Feast and Fast Days in which the Church participates, through Word and Sacrament, in the Good News of Jesus Christ and His presence with His Church until the end of the time.

The Christian liturgical year enables us, by the Holy Spirit and grace of God, to enter into God's story of salvation through: 1) the gathering of the Christian community (Greek, ecclesia); 2) the proclamation of the Word within the fellowship of the gathered community (Greek, ecclesia, koinonia) and 3) the celebration of Sacraments (Greek, ecclesia, koinonia and anamnesis). We are actually participants in God's story of salvation through the Mass - Christian worship on the Lord's Day (see below Justin Martyr's description of early Christian worship on the Lord's Day as he experienced it during his lifetime beginning in the Apostolic Age). Through the Eucharist (the Mass) we participate in God's story of: the creation; the fall of humanity (i.e., the introduction of sin, suffering and death into God's first creation); the promise of redemption (see Genesis 3:15); the covenant/promise to Abraham (Genesis 15:1-6); the incarnation - life - ministry - death - resurrection - and ascension of Jesus Christ our Lord and the fulfillment of the covenant made to Abraham (John 8:56); the gift of the Holy Spirit (Acts. 2:1-11); the second coming of Jesus and the fulfillment of all things. We are not simply giving thanks for salvation history when we gather as God's people to celebrate the Holy Eucharist in the Mass on the Lord's Day (or during the week), we are actual participants in God's story of salvation, the story of our redemption!

Anglicans believe that divine worship transcends that which is earthly and ordinary. The Mass is something heavenly and extraordinary; a meeting place between God and man, the Creator and his creation, heaven and earth, the infinite and the finite, the eternal and the temporal. "Then Jacob awoke from his sleep and said, "Surely the LORD is in this place, and I did not know it… How awesome is this place! This is none other than the house of God, and this is the gate of heaven" (Genesis 28:16).

Robert E. Webber, an evangelical Anglican, wrote: "Although worship dramatizes an event that happened long ago, it brings that event into the present [Greek, anamnesis] by the power of the Holy Spirit. In each worship experience, I am present in the actual event... On Christmas I am present at the birth of Christ; on Epiphany I am there at the presentation of Christ; on Maundy Thursday I am present at the Last Supper; on Good Friday I am taken to the cross and put into the tomb; on Easter I stand at the empty tomb; and on Pentecost Sunday I receive the Holy Spirit." Robert E. Webber, (Worship Is a Verb: Celebrating God's Mighty Deeds of Salvation Peabody, MA: Hendrickson Publishing, 1992), 119-120.

This concept (anamnesis) was something understood by the Jews, God's people, long before the coming of Jesus. That is, God invites us into his story as participants. Through sacramental worship (i.e., gathering, Word and Sacrament), God's Story of Salvation becomes a present reality enabling the believer to share in God's story and the benefits thereof!

If we understand and believe this, we will strive to be present on the Lord's Day for Mass and even perhaps during the week. To share in the Mass (i.e., the gathering, Word and Sacrament) is to share in Him and His story of salvation. God's story becomes our story. We will also mourn when persons are absent on the Lord's Day and long to bring the Word and Sacrament to the sick and homebound.

A Second Century Description of Christian Worship on the Lord's Day (The Holy Eucharist)

"...For all that we receive we bless the Maker of all things through his Son Jesus Christ and the Holy Spirit.

And on the day which is called the Sun's Day [the Lord's Day] there is an assembly [ecclesia; meaning church] of all who live in the city, towns or the country; and the memoirs of the apostles and the writings of the prophets are read [the Readings], as much as time permits. When the reader has finished, the Celebrant gives a discourse [Sermon], admonishing us and exhorting us to imitate these excellent examples. Then we all rise together and offer prayer [Prayers of the People]; bread is brought and wine and water; and the Celebrant offers up prayers and thanksgiving [in Greek, "eucharist"] and the people assent with "Amen." Then follows the distribution of the Eucharistic gifts and the partaking of them by all; and they are sent to the absent by the hands of the deacons...We hold our common assembly on the Sun's Day because it is the first day on which God put to flight darkness and chaos and made the world; and on this day Jesus Christ our Saviour rose from the dead...He appeared to his Apostles and Disciples and taught them these things, which we have handed on to you" (Justin Martyr, 150 AD).

Noonday Prayer on Mondays: This will continue via Zoom. All are welcome. Following Noonday Prayer we offer a time of free prayer for all who are able to join in.

Holy Confession in Advent:

Sacraments are marked moments of God's presence, anointing and healing in our lives. There are many good reasons to seek the assurance of pardon and absolution in the Sacrament (Sacramental Rite) of Confession: there are times when we need the assurance of God's love and forgiveness, marked moments of His healing grace and power; times when we are in need of Godly counsel and advice; times when we need to unburden our troubled consciences; and of course, times when we have fallen into grievous and willful sin. Confession is a Sacrament of Healing. It is a tour of the heart. Advent and Lent are particularly good times to seek the assurance of God's grace and forgiveness in Confession. The Sacrament of Confession is available by appointment. Please call Fr. Michael at 508-330-2179.

Holy Confession (going deeper):

People long for marked moments of God's love, healing, forgiveness, and grace in their lives. The soul longs to find the mercy of God at the foot of the cross. Holy Confession and Absolution is one such moment. By the power of the Holy Spirit, one finds that the cross of Jesus becomes a present reality for them. They are truly at the foot of the cross and there they experience the love and mercy of God in a profound way. It is a marked moment, through which we are assured of God's forgiveness and the absolution of our sins. Holy Confession is not subjective ("I feel forgiven") but is objective ("I am forgiven"). We are assured of our forgiveness by the power and promise of God's Word and the authority of His Church. Sometimes we need to receive the Word of God declared through His priest, saying, "YOU ARE FORGIVEN." In Holy Confession, Jesus is not present to us as Divine Judge (unless we harden our hearts to His mercy), but as Divine Physician. He comes not to condemn, but to heal, restore, strengthen, and raise us up. See: John 20:23; 1 Timothy 2:3-4; 2 Peter 3:9; Ezekiel 18:23.

From our People's Warden

• The Food Pantry: Thank you to all who have continued to replenish the food pantry. The list of food needed is: canned fruit; canned corn; canned green beans; canned soups (popular kinds only, such as chicken noodle, vegetable, minestrone, tomato, clam chowder); peanut butter and jelly (strawberry, grape, raspberry); mac-n-cheese; spaghetti and sauce; canned tuna; canned chicken; mayonnaise and bags of rice. Please limit food donations to those mentioned above. These items can be dropped off on Saturday from 3:30-4:00 or brought on Sunday when coming to Mass.

• Winter Coat Program: The winter coat program is going along nicely. One hundred thirty-eight people from our area have received coats for themselves and their children. Southborough Food Pantry representatives stopped by to fill a list of thirty coats needed for their depleted supply and ninety-one coats were needed for Afghanistan refugees who relocated to this area. We need at least one volunteer per week, please, to help on Wednesdays until at least mid-March. At this time, only small children's coats are needed. We have enough men's and women's coats, also enough hats, scarves, and gloves. Thank you for all the donations.

• Parishioners needing rides: Some of our parishioners have a need for rides to doctors' appointments or to do errands. If you have some free time during the week and are able to help, please speak to me.
